



llinois has had six Capitol Buildings — one in Kaskaskia, three in Vandalia and two in Springfield. At 361 feet tall, our capitol building is the tallest non-skyscraper classical capitol building, exceeding the height of the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C.

The "lost" cornerstone of the State House was found in the fall of 1885 when workers were preparing the foundation for the east portico and was reburied until it was rediscovered in 1944.

There are 110 steps from the first floor to the fourth-floor gallery. This is one of the grandest staircases in the United States.

It took 250 bushels of coal per day to keep the State House comfortably warm during "this weather," March of 1877.

Coal was mined briefly on the Capitol grounds.

There is a star in the marble tile at the base of the sculpture of a woman with open arms in the middle of the 1st floor rotunda. How many points does it have? What does each point represent?

The sculpture represents "Illinois Welcoming the World." The plaster statue was first displayed in the Illinois Building at the 1893 Columbian Exposition. The sculptor, Julia M. Bracken, was asked to reproduce the statue in bronze for the Capitol. It was dedicated on May 16, 1895.

During Youth to Washington, an attendee is selected to represent the state of Illinois on the Youth Leadership Council, also known as the YLC. The YLC representative is chosen by his or her peers. There is one student chosen from each state.

The purpose of this council is to build leadership and public speaking skills, and to enhance the delegates' knowledge of the energy industry and the cooperative form of business. Members of the YLC play a critical role during National Rural Electric Cooperatives' (NRECA) annual meeting, having a hands-on experience with virtually every facet of the meeting, including the resolutions process

and helping our members communicate with their legislators. A YLC National Spokesperson is selected through a competitive speech to represent that YLC class. They are then given the opportunity to address the NRECA membership at their annual meeting.

YLC members leave the process more poised, confident and a better developed leader with a strong determination to improve their communities and make their country a better place. These students also make presentations at their state and local cooperative annual meetings. If you are chosen to represent your cooperative on the Youth to Washington Tour, please consider applying for the YLC position.
