87th Annual Meeting of Members

Members of Norris Electric Cooperative (NEC) gathered in the gymnasium of Newton Community High School on Saturday, Feb. 22, for the cooperative's 87th Annual Meeting of Members. The event provided an opportunity for consumer-members to receive updates from the cooperative's leadership on key initiatives and developments. Board President Gordon McClure opened the meeting by welcoming attendees and acknowledging their active participation in the cooperative.

During the manager's report, General Manager Tamara Phillips detailed the cooperative's 2024 accomplishments, highlighting the completion of 30 miles of line rebuilds. "We are making great progress, with only 100 miles remaining in our long-term upgrade plan," Phillips noted. "These improvements have already led to an 8% reduction in outages, thanks to advancements in system technology and vegetation management."

Phillips also emphasized the cooperative's focus on infrastructure improvements. "Our new pole yard is enhancing operational efficiency, and we are actively

evaluating upgrades to our meter system to give members better tools to monitor their energy usage," she explained.

Despite increasing power costs, Phillips reassured members that rates will remain steady for another year. "We understand how important stable rates are to our members, and we are working diligently to manage costs while maintaining service reliability," she said.

Phillips also announced Norris Electric's transition to Dairyland Power Cooperative as its energy supplier in mid-2026. "This partnership with Dairyland Power will strengthen our ability to deliver dependable energy to our members," she added. Dairyland President and CEO Brent Ridge, along with key executives, were introduced to members. Capital credits remain a priority, with \$1.4 million refunded to members from 1988 to 1989 in 2024. "Returning capital credits is one of the biggest benefits of cooperative membership, and we are proud to have refunded \$16.5 million to members over the past decade," Phillips said.

Treasurer Dan Strine presented the financial report, emphasizing that Norris Electric's records adhere to Generally Accepted Accounting Practices and Government Auditing Standards. President McClure provided a financial overview, stating, "Our commitment remains to provide reliable power at affordable rates while continuing necessary infrastructure upgrades."

During the meeting, Robinson High School student Victoria McMillan and Newton Community High School student Alex Birchfield were introduced. McMillan and Birchfield represented NEC in June 2024 during the annual Youth to Washington Tour. They thanked NEC members for their support as they shared their top experiences while on the trip, seeing monuments, speaking with legislators, learning more about the co-op business model, and meeting students across Illinois and the U.S.

In addition, NEC also awarded four \$500 scholarships to high school seniors in attendance. The scholarship winners were Sydney Kinder, Newton Community High School; Ava Patchett, Oblong High School; Noah Koester, Teutopolis High School; and Sophia Niemerg, Dieterich High School.

The results of the election for four seats on NEC's board of directors were announced. Kurt Holscher, Crawford County; Justin Parcel, Clark County; Ted Helmink, Cumberland County; and Dave Sheppard, Jasper County were all reelected to the board.

After a call for new business and many prizes awarded, the meeting was adjourned. Members were then treated to fried chicken and pulled pork for lunch. All registered members in attendance also received a \$10 bill credit on their electric bill.



Important update regarding payment options

In response to the rising costs in today's economy, we are implementing a change designed to keep billing costs low. Over the years, Norris Electric Cooperative (NEC) has introduced a variety of payment options to make it more convenient for our members. Due to the availability of these options, the board of directors has decided to discontinue the collection of electric bills at local banks. As of May 1, 2025, banks will no longer accept payments for Norris Electric Cooperative.

Below are alternative payment methods available to you:

- **Automatic draft** — NEC will automatically draft your checking or savings account the day before the due date. An ACH form is available at your bank or the Norris website for your convenience.
- **Bank online payments** — Set up an electronic payment through your bank, which will transfer funds directly to NEC.

- **Over the phone** — You can make payments anytime through our automated payment center by calling 877-783-8765.
- **Online payments or mobile app** — Pay through our website at www.norriselectric.com or by downloading the Norris app from your app store.
- **Norris Electric office** — Payments can be made in person during our office hours, Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. A secure drop box is available outside the office for payments made after hours.
- **Mail** — Payments can always be mailed to our office.
